

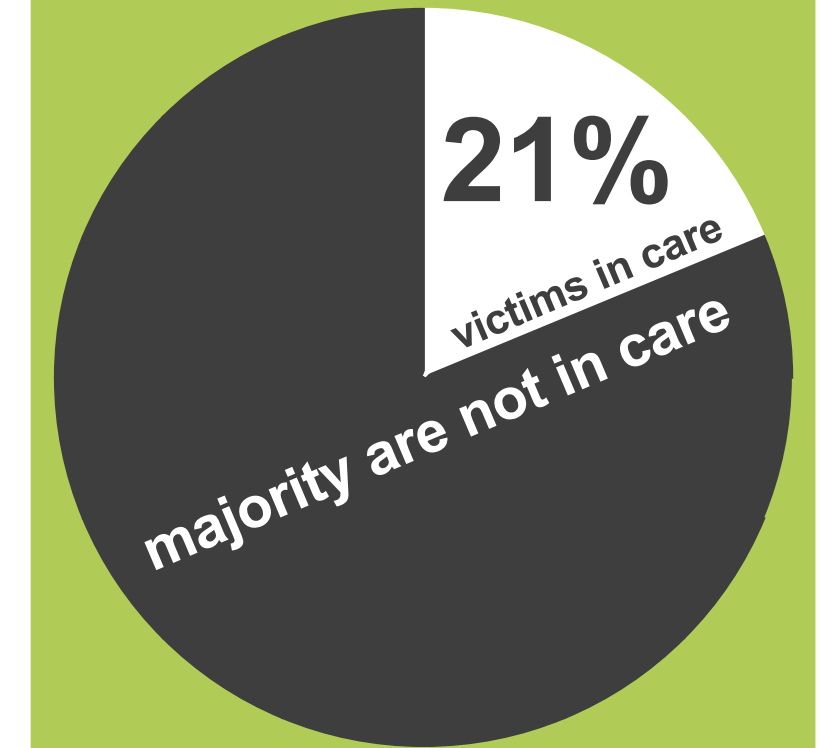
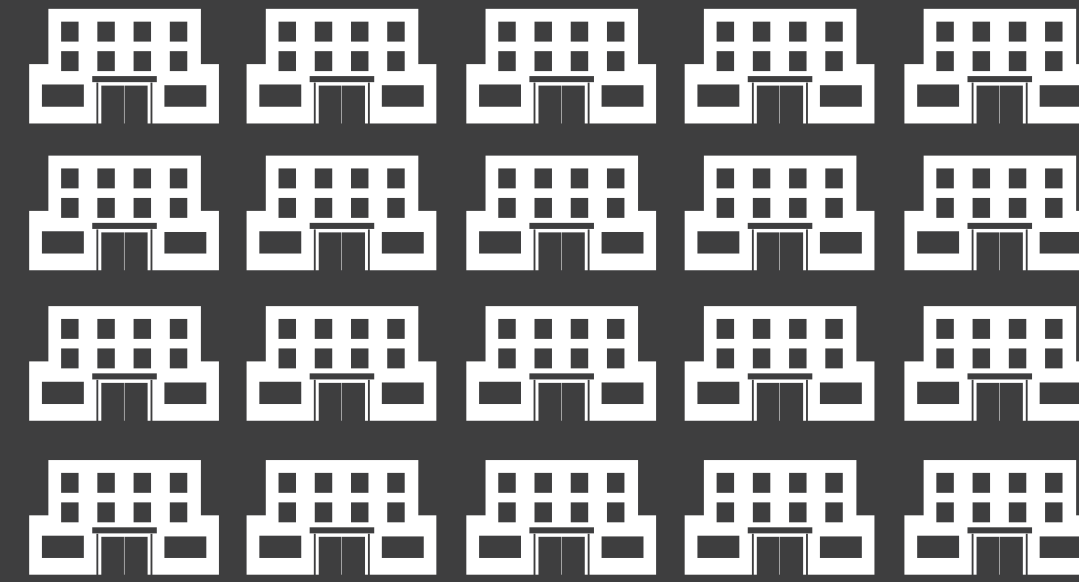

2,409 children and young people in England were confirmed victims of child sexual exploitation in gangs and groups (in 14 months between August 2010 to October 2011). This is equivalent of every pupil in three medium sized secondary schools being subjected to sexual violence on a routine basis. It is generally agreed that the true number of victims is higher.

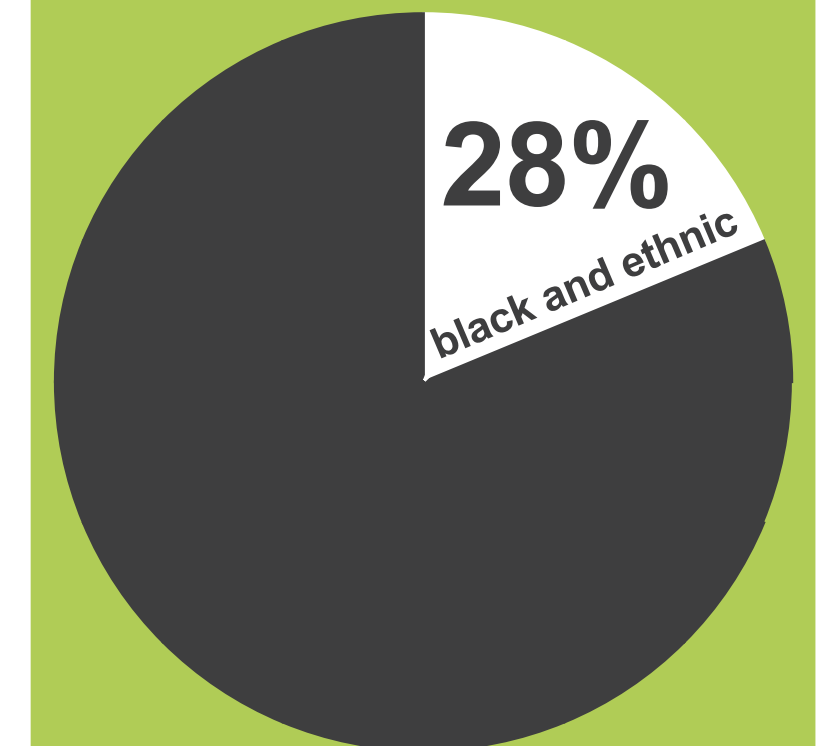


16,500

On top of this in 12 months there were 16,500 children in England who were at high risk of child sexual exploitation – the equivalent of 20 medium sized secondary schools.¹



21 per cent of victims were living in care. The majority of children that have suffered sexual exploitation do not live in care.²



28 per cent of victims reported to the Inquiry were from black and ethnic minority backgrounds.³

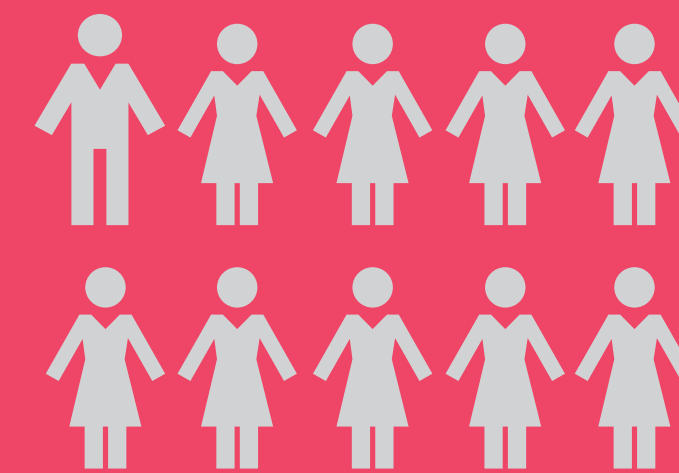
Sexually-exploited children and young people range in age from 4 to 19 with a peak age of 15.⁴
